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EAST WINCH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 7 MARCH 2023

There was nothing further to report on the issue of toxic smells, or on the safety works being undertaken to the A47 between King's Lynn and Pentney.

Two issues had been raised by individual parishioners. First, the safety and maintenance of the trees along Church Lane by East Winch Church. This was a matter for the Diocese as landowner. And second, the possibility of having a trod/footpath along the A47 linking West Bilney to East Winch. Parish Council was doubtful as to whether this would be seen as economically or practically viable, but the Clerk would make inquiries of National Highways.

Parish Council received reports from County Councillor, Cllr Jim Moriarty and from Borough Councillor, Cllr Michael De Whalley who briefed the Parish Council in particular on developments around the designation of West Winch as a Strategic Growth Area in the Current Local Plan. The independent planning inspectorate was expected to hold a consultation in the Summer in which the Parish Council would be invited to participate.

Parish Council was concerned to note the issues around the shortage of Trustees for East Winch Village Hall and its possible closure, and looked forward to hearing the outcome of the meeting on Friday 10 March.

A risk assessment had been undertaken, and faulty streetlights, potholes, and un-replenished saltbins would be reported. A replacement dog poo bin was needed at the junction of Town Close/Gayton Road. And a Parish noticeboard was to be installed in the bus stop on Lynn Road.

The Clerk would register the defibrillator located at the Village Hall with the ambulance service.

Parish Council elections are to take place on 4 May 2023. For those interested in standing as a candidate, the deadline for submission of Parish Councillor nomination papers is Tuesday 4 April. Full details are available on the Borough of King's Lynn and West Norfolk website.

Parishioners are also reminded that voter PhotoID will be required for the first time in this year's local elections. Again, full details are available on the Borough's website (see also the article on Page 11 of this magazine).

The Parish Council is seeking a village handyman to take over from Roger Bland who is retiring after 11 years in the role which comes with a small honorarium. Anyone interested should contact the Parish Clerk, bob.pannell1@btinternet.com

The next Parish Council Meeting will be held in East Winch Village Hall on Tuesday 16 May, beginning at 7.30pm.

Middleton Parish Council Chairman's Report

The main topics of discussion at our last two meetings have been lorries on Station Road and Hill Road, Improvements to Water Lane and Coronation celebrations.

Lorries on Station Road

There has been much discussion lately and in recent years regarding this issue. The main concerns are the volume of lorries, the speed in which they travel, the times of day they pass through and the damage to the roads. All councillors agree that this is a problem. Unfortunately we have always come up against a brick wall with this issue. It was suggested that a 7.5 tonne weight restriction be put on Station Road and Hill road. The Parish Councillors agreed to support this. The next step is to put it in writing to our County Councillor, Jim Moriarty and he will take it further.

Water Lane

There is some funding from County level to make improvements to Water Lane. It was made quite clear by Cllr. Moriarty that this money wouldn't be sufficient and isn't for trying to close the middle of Water Lane to traffic. After consultation with residents and a good turn out at the March meeting, it was agreed that we would ask for additional signage including access only and not suitable for HGVs. We also asked for speed bumps and a width restriction. Cllr. Moriarty is going to find out how much of this is achievable within the budget allowed. It has been brought to my attention that it was reported in 'Your Local Paper' that Water Lane will have a continual one way restriction from bottom to top, but this isn't correct and we made it quite clear that this isn't something we would support.

Coronation Celebrations

We were pleased that a number of parishioners got in touch and offered to help with the Coronation event. The event will be held on Saturday 6th of May. There will be a family picnic on the playing field in the daytime with refreshments and games which is open to everyone. There will also be a ticketed event in the Village Hall in the evening with hog roast, live singer and a paid bar will be available. The tickets will be £1 per person and are simply required to control numbers as the Village Hall is

limited to 200 people. The Village Hall committee have said that they will cover the cost of the licensing fee for the bar.

Parish Council elections are coming up on the 4th of May. If you would be interested in running as a candidate to be a parish councillor and have your say then please get in touch.

Wednesday 26th April 2023 at 7.30pm "The Unique Life of a Ranger on Blakeney Point" Presented by Ajay Tegala

Ajay Tegala is a wildlife presenter, conservationist, countryside ranger and naturalist. With a degree and a decade of experience in Environmental Conservation, Ajay has chalked up 20 television appearances across the five main channels, including the popular BBC nature programmes Countryfile, Coast and Winterwatch.

In addition to presenting a film on Springwatch 2021, Ajay has also worked as a researcher and story developer on the series at Wild Ken Hill. Ajay has earned respect as the ranger on Britain's first coastal reserve, Blakeney Point in north Norfolk. This is the subject of his book "The Unique Life of a Ranger" first published in 2022, which gives an insight into his unique experiences protecting wildlife on a remote stretch of England's east coast.

In his spare time, Ajay conducts wildlife surveys on farmland in the Norfolk Broads, championing and monitoring the success of habitat creation for nature on farms. He has a great love for the East Anglian landscape, is passionate about conservation grazing and fenland habitat restoration.

Wednesday 31st May 2023 at 7.30pm "Birds seen in the County of Norfolk since 1850" Presented by Neil Coe

Neil Coe is a well-known and experienced member of NarVOS. His love of birding has brought him into contact with many bird species across the County. In his presentation he is hoping to share some of his more unusual findings whilst giving a panoramic overview of the range of avian species which birders may be fortunate enough to encounter in Norfolk.

In his own words: "My experience in birding goes back as far as my childhood, when at the

age of ten I nursed an injured Stone Curlew back to health! I am now, according to my grandchildren, an old man of 77! but still have the burning passion for our feathered friends and been fortunate to travel to foreign parts to satisfy my desire for the exotic!!! However, some years ago at a NarVOS meeting a comment was directed to me with regard to the wonderful birds that from time to time have graced our great county in addition to our bountiful residents!!! Therefore, it is my aim to illustrate those birds to any persons that do not wish to endure airports etc., but would still like to see the little and large and the pretty and the plain of our county! I look forward to meeting and showing you what can be seen with some effort."


North Runcton News

West Winch Growth Area (WWGA)

In the last update in the January Parish newsletter, it was noted that the Local Plan examination had been adjourned to allow BCKLWN time to prepare more information to support their proposals.

We have since learnt that the examiners raised two principal concerns relevant to the WWGA:

- 1. They queried the nature of the proposed A10/railway 'Strategic Growth Corridor', when 40% of Borough housing growth is proposed at West Winch (which obviously has no railway station), whilst comparatively little is allocated at Downham or Watlington. 'We question, therefore, whether this component of the spatial strategy is justified as appropriate, based on the evidence, and consistent with national policy in enabling the delivery of sustainable development', and;
- 2. They questioned how the Core Strategy Policy for 1600 dwellings at WWGA by 2026 had ballooned to 2500 dwellings by 2036 (and 4000 dwellings in the fullness of time) in the current plan. They have stated there is simply not the evidence to show that the site is capable of absorbing this amount of development. 'As yet, therefore, we are unable to conclude that the proposed allocation for up to 4,000 dwellings at the WWGA, in Policy E2.1, is justified as appropriate based on the evidence, nor that it would deliver sustainable development in accordance with national policy'.



These comments would appear to entirely vindicate concerns the Parish Councils have raised about the scale of the planned growth and the likely dependence on road transport. They also appear to imply that the examiners would be supportive of alternative housing allocations near the existing rail stations.

However, at the 'West Winch Local Stakeholders' Meeting held on 2nd March, BCKLWN officers stated they propose to side step this matter by striking out all reference to the 'strategic corridor'. They will not be allocating more development at Downham or Watlington and would be working on the evidence to support the plan for 4000 houses at West Winch.

They also reported that a grant application had been submitted to Homes England to cover the 'developer contribution gap' for the road funding (about 15% of costs, that developers will eventually pay back). We also understand letters have begun going out to landowners to enquire about land purchases. More land surveys continue.

An NCC summary of consultation feedback relating to the road plans stated that 160 people sent in comments and that there was general support for the plans. We were also told that some people said they were so content with the proposals, they didn't feel the need to respond!

This summary contrasts sharply with the feedback that parish councillors have received – which was overwhelmingly negative in tone. Whereas many residents may feel that 'resistance is futile', it is important that, if the whole scheme proceeds, we end up with the best possible outcomes. We will only get these by arguing for them.

We would therefore ask that all residents please report your support, opposition, ideas or any other feedback on the West Winch Growth Area, simply so that we know we are continuing to reflect community views. Contact: northrunctonparishclerk@outlook.com

'Wash Barrage'

NRPC representatives were recently invited to join a webinar hosted by the King's Lynn Joint Advisory Group for the Wash – a panel that includes the Conservancy Board, fisherman, wildfowlers, environmental groups and others. They had extended an invitation to 'parishes around the Wash'.

The main topic under discussion was the proposal made by a group called 'Centre Port' for an 11 mile long 'hydroelectric dam' from north of Boston to east of Hunstanton, including plans for port expansion at Boston and a road along the whole structure.



It transpired that none of the groups had been previously consulted about the plan, no detailed feasibility study has been undertaken and therefore no environmental impact assessment. Attendees seemed generally sceptical of the whole idea.

However, at a recent presentation in King's Lynn by Robert Nicholls, Director of the Tyndall Centre for Climate Change Research at the UEA, it was stated that a 2m sea level rise was inevitable in the next 100-150 years, irrespective of whatever we manage to do to curb CO2 emissions. So coastal defence of some kind will be required.

Fatbergs

We have recently had a problem with a gulley at the rear of the Village Meeting Place. It turned out that the drains were backing up due to a large and disgusting 'fatberg' in the sewer at the rear of the building. The system has now been cleared and it may or may not be the case that effluent from the VMP was the cause of the problem.

We perhaps think of this as an urban problem – but clearly it can happen in a small village as well. It may be timely to remind all residents of the basic guidance now generally provided by water companies that should be relevant to all domestic and commercial premises:

- Do not pour fats, oils, grease or pieces of solid food down the sink.
- Only flush the 'three P's' down the toilet – pee, poo, paper!

 Do not flush wet wipes (which are mainly plastic), sanitary towels, cotton wool, nappies or any other non-biodegradable products down the toilet.

North Runcton Conservation Volunteers

The group have recently undertaken some tree planting in Sheep's Course Wood and undertaken a well-attended litter pick in February. In a few hours we cleaned along most of the roads around North Runcton making a big difference – at least for a few days! Many thanks to Jane for helping to organise and to everyone who attended.

Community Speedwatch

Cllr John Braybrooke has been operating the vehicle activated speed signs in the village and has regularly reported vehicles travelling at 60-70mph in a 30mph zone. Whilst the speed signs might remind considerate drivers to slow down – we feel we need to reintroduce a speedwatch group. We know the threat of being recorded provides a deterrent to reckless driving.

We would like to enlist and train at least 12 more people to operate occasional speedwatch sessions. A larger group will allow us to have a rota so that no one has to be present for more than a few sessions a year.

Can you offer a few hours a year to ensure our roads are safer for pedestrians cyclists and animals in the village? We would like to organise the training session in the next month or so.

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
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BATTERIES AND SMALL ELECTRICAL ITEMS INCLUDED WITH WEEKLY BIN COLLECTIONS

Since the end of January, residents have been able to recycle used batteries with their weekly free bin collection service. The service is now being gradually rolled out to include small electrical items.

Batteries and small electrical items **MUST NOT** be put into the black or green bins themselves.

USED BATTERIES

In the case of batteries, simply put them in a **separate tied up freezer bag, or similar sized clear bag,** on top of your black or green bin on collection day.

The following batteries are included in this service:

AA, AAA, C (toys, torches, portable radios), D (torches, stereos), 6V (medical instruments, cameras), 9V (fire alarms), Button (including hearing aid batteries)

There is limited space on the vehicles and so residents are asked to place batteries out 'little and often. Only one small tied freezer size bag of batteries will be collected at a time.

Batteries <u>not included</u> in this service are car batteries, damaged batteries and loose lithiumion (extracted from laptops, mobile phones, tablets).

SMALL ELECTRICAL ITEMS

The service for collection of small electrical items is being gradually rolled out from the end of February. Residents will be informed when the service starts in their area by means of a hanger placed on their bin the week before collections start in their area.

Once you have received the hanger notifying you of the start of the service, small electrical items must be presented inside one loosely tied-up small standard size supermarket carrier bag, on top of either your black or green bin on collection day.

As there is limited space on collection vehicles, residents are kindly asked to follow a 'little and often' approach. If items are not collected due to lack of space on the vehicle, please take them back in and put them out the following week.

All batteries must be removed where possible and recycled separately as above, with the exception of products such as laptops, mobile phones, electric toothbrushes and tablets with lithium batteries built into them.

We can take and recycle the following electrical items:

- Blenders
- Calculators
- Cameras
- Chargers
- Clippers
- Clocks
- Coffee grinders
- Coffee machines
- Curlers
- Drills
- Small DVD players
- Electrical cables
- Electric and battery-powered toys
- Electric scales
- Electric shavers
- Electric toothbrushes (leave battery in)
- Electric whisks
- Extension leads
- Small Fans
- Games consoles and controllers
- Grinders
- Hair dryers
- Hair straighteners
- Hand-held hoovers
- Hi-Fi equipment

- · Impact drivers
- Irons
- Juicers
- Kettles
- Keyboards and mice
- Small Lamp (lightbulbs removed)
- Laptops (leave battery in)
- Light switches
- Mains sockets
- Mobile phones (leave battery in)
- Printers (without ink cartridges or toners)
- Radios
- · Remote controls
- Routers
- Sanders
- Sandwich makers
- Set top boxes
- Soldering irons
- Tablets (leave battery in)
- Telephones
- Thermostats
- Two slice toasters
- VHS players
- Watches

This is not a complete list, but the general rule is that items up to the size of a two-slice toaster may be recycled in this way, including accompanying cables.

Please remember to be data secure and if you are putting out laptops, mobile phones or devices that could contain sensitive data and passwords you need to carry out a "Factory reset" to wipe your data first.

We cannot take the following:

Anything bigger than a two-slice toaster, Anything sharp i.e., electric knife, Cookers, Desktop computers, Large white goods, Microwave Ovens, Televisions, Vacuum cleaners, Vapes and disposable vapes.

If your small electrical items are still working and could be used by someone else, please consider donating it to a charity shop as we really only want items that are at the end of their usable life.

WEST NORFOLK RESIDENTS NEED PHOTO ID TO VOTE AT ELECTIONS IN MAY

For the first time, residents in King's Lynn and West Norfolk will need to show photographic ID to vote at this year's local elections. Residents are being urged to make sure they are ready to vote in May by checking they have an accepted form of ID and remembering to take it with them when they vote.

Acceptable forms of photo ID include:

- UK driving licence or passport*
- Bus pass
- Blue badge
- PASS proof of age card

*As long as the photo still looks like you and your name on the ID is the same as your name on the electoral register, it doesn't matter if the ID is out of date. A full list of acceptable photo ID is available at www.electoralcommission.org.uk.

Anyone who wants to have their say in the elections this May must also be registered to vote. It only takes five minutes to register online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote. Voters wishing to apply to their council for free ID should first make sure they are registered to vote.

The requirement to show photo ID at the polling station, is a new requirement, introduced by the UK Government's Elections Act which was passed last year and comes into effect for the first time this May.

People who don't have a photo ID at all can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate (VAC) and the council can help with this.

To apply for a Voter Authority Certificate online, visit: https://www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate. Applicants need their National Insurance number or other documents (which must be scanned in or uploaded), such as utility bill, council tax statement, birth certificate, and a passport-style photograph. Full details provided on the gov.uk website.

The council is running drop-in sessions where they will go through the process with people for anyone who would like help with it. Applicants need to take their National Insurance number or other documents such as utility bill, council tax statement or birth certificate. The sessions are as follows:

King's Court (council offices) in Chapel St, King's Lynn every Tuesday, 2pm-5pm, and every Wednesday 9am-12noon. There will be a final, all-day session from 9am-5pm on Tuesday, 25 April (which is the closing date for VAC applications).

Hunstanton Library: every Wednesday 9am-12pm, until 19 April. There will be a final, longer session on 25 April from 10am-12.30pm and 1.30pm-4pm.

Downham Market Library: every Thursday 2-5pm, until 20 April. There will be a final, longer session on 25 April 10am-12.30pm and 1.30pm-4pm.

The county's other libraries are also able to offer some help with the process, including free access to public computers and WIFI, at any time that the library is open. They can also give people one-to-one support to go through the process by appointment.

At libraries voters will need to take their National Insurance number and, importantly, their own device that can be used to take and upload a photograph, even if they are going to the library for support. If visiting a library for help voters should check local opening times and make an appointment if one-to-one help is needed.

If you do not have internet access, call 01553 616200 for a paper form to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate or to request a postal vote.

Typically, clients will receive befriending visits or telephone calls fortnightly. Due to the popularity of our service we can only offer befriending for up to a year and we can only offer a client one service.

Clients and volunteers are closely supported in their befriending match. All befriending matches will be regularly reviewed by a member of staff throughout the year's service.

We facilitate reintegration to community life wherever possible. Clients are frequently signposted to other services and organisations that may be able to help them.

West Norfolk Befriending accepts referrals from concerned friends and relatives as well as professionals working with clients, or we are happy to accept self-referrals.

We want to make sure Befriending is the right service and will always speak to you on the phone first. It's important that we have all the information we need to assess the situation properly and be able to give the right support.
