### New Road Consultation

Residents are now invited to 'have their say' about the proposed 'West Winch Housing Access Road' which will form part of the required new infrastructure to support the BCKLWN allocation for 4000 new houses.

The consultation period will extend from Monday, 14th November until Sunday, 8th January and you can comment on line at the NCC website www.norfolk.gov.uk/WestWinchA10.

By the time this magazine is distributed, there will be two 'consultation events' still to be held. One is on **Saturday 10th December from 10am to 4pm at North Runcton Village Meeting Place** (opposite the church). <u>We</u> **strongly recommend that local residents attend.** This is probably the most significant new section of road proposed in the area since the King's Lynn bypass in the 1970s. The other event is at **West Winch Primary School on Wednesday, 4 January from 4pm to 9pm.** 

We expect the exhibition to include a preliminary design for the road showing the proposed carriageway location, junction arrangements and associated infrastructure. This will be the first public presentation of such plans, and we would hope that it will add detail to the existing adopted BCKLWN policy as set out in the Local Plan (2016) which states at Policy E2.1 that:

- A new road linking the A10 and A47 to provide a degree of relief of traffic on the existing A10 around West Winch, and access to new development
- Early and continuing delivery of various traffic calming measures and environmental enhancements on the existing A10 in and around West Winch, for the benefit of existing local residents, with the first measures commencing within 12 months of the start of development.
- Provision of: a) suitable arrangements for public transport to route through the wider site, and connectivity to main routes to encourage non car modes b) a

network of cycle and pedestrian routes (including links to King's Lynn town centre) which would facilitate the level of growth both that planned to 2026 and potential further growth

- A network of cycle and pedestrian routes (including links to King's Lynn town centre) which would facilitate the level of growth both that planned to 2026 and potential further growth
- Local highway improvements and management measures to fully integrate the development into the surrounding network while avoiding adverse impacts including, in particular, consideration of the capacity of the Hardwick interchange and environmental and amenity impacts of potential additional traffic through North Runcton.

Consultees should also be reminded that the adopted North Runcton and West Winch Neighbourhood Plan (2017) sets out specific requirements for what the Borough Council were then referring to as the 'relief road' (see the North Runcton parish website for the full Neighbourhood Plan and policy GA04 'Design of relief road').

In designing the proposed relief road, the following design elements should be included where possible:

- A roundabout or similar 'free flow' junction at Gravelhill Lane to eradicate congestion and queues and to provide safe local access to the A10/relief road.
- Rectory Lane and Chequers Lane to remain as through roads and incorporate safe cycle and pedestrian crossings.
- Cycle and/or pedestrian paths to be provided on both sides of the relief road corridor and these should be generally separated from the road carriageway by a sustainable soft landscape strip (grass verge, hedge, tree planting – or preferably a mix of all three).
- Appropriate safe cycle and pedestrian crossing points to be provided at regular intervals along the road – and specially to link desire lines between local centres, recreational facilities and public transport

be considered.

- The design should fully integrate environmental impact mitigation features especially ensuring that existing and proposed settlement is mitigated from traffic noise and night lighting impacts. Night lighting should be minimised, especially in sections adjacent to an agricultural backdrop. The road surface should be designed to minimise tyre noise.
- A maximum speed of 40 mph for the relief road – but a 30mph limit may be appropriate and desirable in some sections. The carriageway design should discourage speeding.

In subsequent discussions in 2018, parish council representatives were told by WSP, the County Council's design engineers, that a flyover bridge suitable for two-way vehicular traffic would be provided on Rectory Lane to maintain local east-west access between the villages. However, Chequers Lane would be permanently closed to traffic and that only a bridge suitable for pedestrian and cycle traffic would be provided.

It is very important that local residents remember this context when providing feedback to Borough and County officers. Parish councillors often feel that they are providing the only continuity in this drawn-out planning process - and, suffice to say, many current officers are new to the project.

It is of interest that the authorities appear to have now distanced themselves from the term 'relief road', although during the recent consultation about the 'framework masterplan' there was much talk about how the new road would 'resolve local traffic problems'. This claim seems dubious.

3-4000 new homes will generate thousands of additional local traffic journeys a day. For residents living adjacent the A10 (which NCC now say carries 24,000 vehicles a day), the idea of having a 'West Winch bypass' that takes away the current through-traffic (including HGVs) is clearly attractive. But in reality, any traffic taken off the existing A10 is very likely to be quickly replaced with new local traffic. For

nodes. Safe wildlife crossings should also the estimated 20 years it will take to build the development, much of that local traffic is likely to be generated by construction.

> Meanwhile, the new proposed road (which we are told, will not be a dual carriageway) seems likely to quickly be carrying in excess of 20,000 vehicles-a-day when complete (NCC are saying 28,000 by 2039). All of this traffic will still be dependent on the Hardwick roundabout as the main distribution junction for the area. It is not easy to see how local traffic issues will be 'resolved' with these plans.

### North Runcton Conservation Volunteers

We recently had a very successful meet in October where the new permissive path down around the Middleton Aggregates Clay Pit was cleared to allow easier passage. We also had a team clearing around tree and hedge planting in Sheep's Course Wood. Thanks to everyone who attended. By the time you read this we will also have completed a litter pick around the village.

# Middleton Parish Council Chairman's Report

The PC met as usual in October and November. It had been hoped that there would be a meeting with Mark Lambert from Highways England immediately prior to the meeting on the 5th October. The day before the meeting, Mark Lambert confirmed he would be in attendance however at 10:30AM, not 6PM. I did my best to spread the word with just 24 hours notice by use of Facebook and the Nextdoor Middleton Page. Due to the short notice, unfortunately only 2 parishioners attended, along with myself, councillor Porter and councillor Applegate. Both of our Borough Councillors, Gidney and Nash attended and County Councillor Moriarty who arranged the meeting.

Mr Lambert was very forthcoming with information on plans for the A47 and was happy to take questions. He explained the proposed safety measures for the A47, including a proper bus stop opposite the car wash for people boarding busses toward Lynn and hopefully another somewhere for busses toward Swaffham. The proposal also includes lowering the speed limit to 30 through Middleton and East Winch and lower speed limits between the villages and the Hardwick. Mr Lambert also talked about 'operation moonshot' operated by the police that included many unmarked police cars patrolling the A47 in our area, catching speeding vehicles. Attendees of the meeting said that they'd never seen anyone stopped for speeding on the A47 locally.

We reported that, at the time of meeting, there had been 3 accidents on the A47 within two weeks and how unsafe the junctions are. We suggested that the traffic lights included both junctions for cars, as well as the pedestrian crossing. Mr Lambert said it wasn't out of the question and was a good idea. We also suggested the widening of the junction of station road onto the A47 to avoid lorries turning onto the wrong side of the road, a consistent pavement along the A47 from the top of Hill Road at Fairgreen, back into Middleton and additional bus stop near the North Runcton turning and the Fair Green turning. Mr Lambert said this could also be looked into. Average

speed cameras through the villages was also suggested and again Mr Lambert said it was a viable option. Cllr Moriarty raised a concern regarding the overnight roadworks on the A47. They seem to take place leading up to Christmas every year, damaging the pubs on the road's trade. Other comments were made agreeing with this and also how badly planned the roadworks are and it's not clear what they're actually doing.

We thanked Mr Lambert for coming and he offered to send us monthly updates of planned works to the A47 and progress with safety measures. As of yet we haven't received anything.

In other news;

The goal posts for the playing field have been delivered and will be fitted soon.
The new notice board for the village green has been delivered and put in place.

- Cllr Porter attended a meeting regarding the proposed plans for the new hospital. These plans have since been published in the papers. There is a model in the entrance to the hospital.

- The smell form the landfill that's been reported has apparently been investigated by the environment agency however we haven't heard anything.

- By the time this will be published I will have attended the remembrance service at Middleton Church to lay a wreath on behalf of the Parish Council.

Our December meeting will be on 7th of December at 7PM. Open to everyone as usual, but there might be the odd mince pie and chocolates available.

Lastly, as odd as it seems to be writing this mid November, on behalf of myself and the Parish Council I'd like to wish everyone a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

## East Winch Parish Council Meeting 8 November 2022

Regular readers will recall that in the 10 Minute Open Forum for Parishioners at the last meeting, a lifelong resident reported that parishioners in East Winch were experiencing a highly pungent smell seemingly coming from one of the nearby facilities (or vehicles servicing those sites). This had been reported to the Environment Agency Hotline and there had not been a recurrence subsequently, but Parish Council agreed that this was an issue that needed to be monitored going forward.

With regards the National Highways' proposals for reduced speed limits (and other safety improvements) on the A47 between Kings Lynn and Pentney, Parish Council considered these were unlikely to be effective without active enforcement measures. Parish Council agreed to take advantage of the consultation on the proposals to press again for a pedestrian crossing for the East Winch section of the A47.

Parish Council received reports from County Councillor, Cllr J Moriarty and from Borough Councillor, Cllr C Manning.

On planning matters:

- The consultation on Min 40 Silica Sand extraction has been extended to December 2022
- There was nothing to report on the Wellness Resort Project
- Planning applications relating to a proposed eastern extension to Pentney Quarry are to be submitted by Middleton Aggregates. Parish Council considered a "Community Liaison Statement" describing the proposals but unfortunately no representative attended the meeting to provide more information or to hear the views of the Council.
- The owner of the site at Pentney Woods, seeking approval for a change of use of woodlands to a holiday and recreation site, had now obtained a tree thinning licence and was proposing to erect a building on the site for the purposes of forestry.

As previously reported, Parish Council has been very impressed with the quality of the Trod under construction by NCC Highways from Station Road to the Post Office and it believes the Trod will represent a major improvement in pedestrian road safety in the village. So Councillors were all the more disappointed to learn that work on it had been suspended by NCC due to cost pressures and that work to completion (including the repainting of road markings) would not be able to resume until the next financial year.

Parish Council agreed to install a new notice board in the bus shelter and a refurbished one at Town Close. A risk assessment had been undertaken, and faulty streetlights and unreplenished saltbins had been identified and would be reported. A preliminary discussion on the budget for 2023/24 took place in advance of substantive consideration at the next meeting.

Parish Council Meetings are now held on a Tuesday (not Monday) evening. The next PC meeting will be held on Tuesday 10 January at 7.30pm.

Until the end of March 2023, Norfolk Libraries Service will be making all 47 of its libraries available as part of the national Warm Welcome campaign. Libraries will remain open for all and provide a space for people to sit in comfort and access a variety of services on offer. These include reading, doing a jigsaw, playing a board game, or joining in Just a Cuppa or activities.

Other **free** services available at Norfolk libraries include:

- Tea, coffee, instant soup, and hot chocolate are available during staffed hours
- Library staff and volunteers can provide visitors with trusted information about other support which is available
- A variety of bags are available for free, with no questions asked.

The bags are:

Warm And Well (Adult and Child bags) containing: a scarf, a hat, gloves, a blanket, socks and a hot water bottle. ► Warm And Well - Toiletries To Go (Adult bags) containing: shampoo, bodywash, deodorant and toothpaste. Warm And Well - Toiletries To Go (Children's bag) containing: shampoo, bodywash, bubble bath & toothpaste. Tricky Period To Go: Two packs of sanitary pads (1 normal, 1 super/night or long in the case of some supplies). Vests and toothbrushes will also be available on request.

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
