Blackborough End Jubilee Group bids farewell - We have had the time of our lives to improve community life for others.

After much discussion at our last meeting the decision was taken to disband the Blackborough End Jubilee Group after 13 years of fund-raising. The group has found it hard over the past couple of years to organise events with fewer group members and also because of their own personal commitments. We believe that the current economic climate has certainly played a part and impacted on fund-raising events.

The Blackborough End Jubilee Group was formed in September 2001 by a band of very willing residents and their initial task was to plan and organise a community party to celebrate the Queen's Golden Jubilee in June 2002. The monies raised between 2001 - 2004 enabled the group to purchase a bench to commemorate the Golden Jubilee and a village sign to put the village on the map.

Over the past 13 years group members have worked tirelessly to raise money to benefit local groups and charities. Such events as Open Gardens, Blackborough Burn-Up, Village sales, Fun-days, Santa

on the Green, house-to-house collections, Christmas Tree Festivals and various sponsored cycle rides have raised almost £12,000.

The local groups & charities that have received donations from our fund-raising are ; St Mary's Church, Friendship Club, Youth Club, Buttercups Playgroup, Roxburgh Children's Centre, QE Hospital, Red Wellies, Breast Cancer, Kidney Dialysis, Prostate Cancer & Cystic Fibrosis.

The Blackborough Jubilee Group would like to give their sincere thanks to all past and present members for their hard work, dedication, enthusiasm and commitment given to the fund-raising events which have benefited our local community and also thanks to local businesses, friends and residents for their support and donations.



Update on North Runcton War Memorial

The War Memorial Committee engaged a professional Arborist who has removed the trees that were overhanging the war memorial. He has also trimmed back others in the vicinity. The cost of this work amounted to £1,100. It has made a tremendous difference and has certainly opened the area up.

The Stone Mason will commence work on the memorial during the last week in June. The memorial will be thoroughly cleaned which may reveal traces of the initial engraving. It is estimated that the cleaning and engraving process will take approximately a week.

Finally, news has just been received that the Borough Council WW1 Grants Fund has awarded us a £1,500 grant. Our grateful thanks are extended to Richard and Mrs Markham who filed the application on our behalf. This money together with the ongoing fund raising will enable us to reach our target and get the memorial restored to its original grandeur honouring those names which are inscribed upon it. Lest we forget.

Annual Report From Chairman of Middleton Parish Council

A47

The most significant event of the year was undoubtedly the completion of the Pedestrian Crossing in August. This marked the culmination of a long running campaign which had first begun in 1982. The Council have continued to argue the case for an extension of the 40mph speed limit to cover all the residential properties along Lynn Road. The Highways Agency argues that the current accident data does not warrant such action at present. We have received a similar response to our continuing requests for a reduction in the speed of the traffic approaching the Hill Road Junction. We continue to pursue action on both issues.

Speeding Traffic

The Council are concerned at the increasing reports we receive about speeding traffic. We were able to secure 75% of the funding necessary to fit 4 sets of speed reduction gates. We were shocked and very disappointed when the gates on East Winch Road were recently stolen. County Council support will enable us to purchase of a Vehicle activated speed sign which we aim to deploy in the near future.

The Police have advised us that their capacity to conduct random "speed checks" is severely restricted. Consequently we are particularly grateful for the continued work of our Speedwatch team but disappointed that a current lack of volunteers has restricted their work north of the A47. We would urge anyone who can spare just a few hours a month to support this vital activity to contact the Clerk.

Finances

For the financial year 2014/2015, the Council decided to request an increase of £2,000 in the precept which represents an additional £3.33 a year for occupiers of Band D properties. This represents the first increase in three years and will enable the Council to meet the estimated annual repayments of a Public Works loan of £20,000 which the Council believes is essential to our plans to refurbish the Playing Field.

Playing Field

The removal of equipment in a dangerous state places even more importance in bringing the planned refurbishment project to a successful conclusion. We received approximately 50 replies to our questionnaire on the future of the Playing Field. If we are to attract the level of grants (approximately £80,000) that will be required to make a significant difference to the Playing Field it is essential that we are able to demonstrate strong commitment from the Community. I would urge everyone to get involved and contribute to the Consultation process over the coming months.

Conclusion

I would like to thank Mr Skipper for his work with the community car scheme and thanks are also due to our community Speedwatch volunteers. I would also like to acknowledge the work of Mr Gardner in maintaining our informative and engaging website. We are also grateful to our Litter Contactor, Mr Smith for the cheerful and effective manner in which he carries out what can be a challenging task.

I am grateful to our Vice Chairman Mick Porter for his support and for his work in representing our interests at the Community Policing meetings and to the rest of our Councillors for their encouragement and commitment. Particular thanks are due to our Clerk, Kate Senter whose efficiency, energy and enthusiasm contributes a great deal to our work.

East Winch Parish Council AGM and Parish meeting 6th May 2014

The main items of interest arising from the meeting were:

Borough Councillor, Mr Moriarty, having confirmed that the incinerator was not going forward, made it clear that the question of waste disposal was one which only the County Council could deal with. In the short term, waste would be sent to Suffolk for incineration. The Borough Council could only recycle and was trying to recycle a much wider range of rubbish than it has facilities for now. The state of the landfill site at Blackborough End was discussed; how much higher it was than the surrounding land; whether it was polluting the area; that it was growing closer to East Winch and the horrible smell.

Mr Velzeboer had been interviewed by Radio Norfolk the previous week about the A47. He had discussed the village's concerns and the proposal that the speed limit should be reduced. His suggestion that there should be double white lines on the A47 through the village had been edited out. Afterwards he had received numerous calls from tractor drivers as far afield as Swaffham and Wells, all agreeing that the speed at which people drove was highly dangerous. Since the meeting, we have heard that Middleton Parish Council are in favour of working with us to fight for improvements to the A47.

The unfinished state of the trod was again discussed. The clerk said that the County Councillor had also raised our dissatisfaction with Highways. Two months ago he had been told that the arrival of the posts was "imminent". We continue to press for the job to be finished.

Mr Harrod reported that no improvements had yet been made to the playground. The care of grounds had been contracted out to Leisure Services Trust by the Borough Council, and we do not yet know how this will affect the service we have formerly received.

Parish Questionnaire

The questionnaire has been finalised and, once printed, will be ready for distribution to all houses in East Winch and West Bilney. It is really important that people answer as many of the questions as possible, so that we get a full picture of the parish's needs. **Volunteers** are needed to hand out and collect questionnaires and then collate the answers. **Please** contact Nell Steele (01553 840814) if you are willing to help.

Incinerator defeated

I am very pleased to say that on 7 April 2014 the incinerator was finally defeated. KLWIN and Farmers Campaign acted as a catalyst but the campaign's success depended on active community involvement and a core of outstanding politicians. When we asked you to write letters, thousands responded making the difference between success and failure.

West Norfolk Borough Council has been exemplary by standing up to County Council pressure. Henry Bellingham led effective lobbying by Norfolk MPs on our behalf. April's victory at County Hall was due to the cross party 'gang of six'. They are: UKIP leader Richard (Toby) Coke, John Dobson (Conservative), Alex Kemp (now Independent), Andrew Boswell (Green Party), Richard Bird (Independent) and Tim East (Lib Dem). They set aside party politics to work together on our behalf.

The incinerator could be described as a 'near miss' in many ways. If it had continued regardless of the public mandate to stop it, voter participation in future elections might have collapsed. After all, why bother voting ever again, if politicians working together cannot stop the incinerator? Thankfully they did stop it, underlining just how important it is to consider your vote carefully at every election. Encouraging more people to pay attention to local government politics will help protect our future; we ignore it at our peril.

Lastly, Michael de Whalley deserves special recognition for his part in starting the campaign; and Richard from Burton Environmental Consulting, for providing his vital support entirely free of charge. Thank You.

“The Task ahead of you is never as great as the Power behind you!”

A reflection on Matthew 28 by Revd Riaz Mubarak

The desperate women had seen Jesus die, and seen him buried. Now they are the first to be told of his resurrection. Their response offers a pattern for all disciples.

It begins with awe and wonder. They are told not to be afraid, but are inevitably awestruck. There are no grounds for taking the resurrection for granted. It is a sovereign act of awesome power. Jesus is raised, never to die again. Death is no longer the end. A new order has begun in which all authority belongs to the risen Lord. Awe leads to joy, because they are reunited with Jesus forever. A relationship has been restored, which nothing and no one, not even death, can break.

Joy turns to worship. The women worshipped him as soon as they saw him, and so did the men. Worshiping God is not a mere duty. It is the instinctive response of those who meet Jesus. There could be no further doubts about his identity and only one response to his person. Trembling at his majesty, and delight at his intimate presence, meet, in the best of Christian worship.

The final response is mission; the disciples are re-commissioned to tell others and make new disciples. Over the years, believers have discovered real hope, joy, love, peace and reconciliation in the living Christ. Finding Him to be with us, helping us, we work together with Him, to the very end of the age.

Benefice Group Meeting

On Wednesday, 18th June at 5.30pm, there is a meeting of representatives from each parish in the benefice to sort out future matters. The meeting will be at 3, Southview Cottages, Common Road, West Bilney, PE32 1JX.

For those of you who have not been there before, turn left off the A47 towards Pentney Lakes in East Winch at the crossroads just after the Carpenters' Arms. After driving for nearly a mile and a half through countryside, you will come to a large newly built house on the left sticking out very obviously. You are nearly there. Shortly beyond that is a wooden fence on the right and a terrace of 3 cottages set back at right angles to the road. 3, Southview is the furthest from the road. The best way to get at it is to drive down the farm track at the end of the wooden fence. On your left is "Conkers" and on your right the second gate, which has "3 Southview" on it, opens to the bottom of the garden. The house has solar panels on the roof.

ARCHERY IN MIDDLETON

Way back in 1363, King Edward III commanded the obligatory practice of archery on Sundays and thus "The Archery Law" was introduced. Each Sunday after Church, straw butts would be set up on village greens throughout England and the men of the Parish would practice with the longbow.

This foresight on Edward's part was to have far reaching consequences. English victories in places such as Crecy, Agincourt and Poitiers would ultimately help to change the political face of Europe forever. Archery is still practiced in the village today, though the emphasis is not so much on European domination! It's more about enjoying the sport of field archery.

Field archery differs from target archery. Rather than shooting at "roundel" targets at set distances, field archers walk a course shooting at three dimensional representations of "prey". King's Lynn field archers are lucky enough to have access to 22 acres of mixed heath woodland and have a permanent 36 target course laid out. The targets are life-sized, constructed from foam and rubber composites and really look the part.

And it's not only longbows that get put through their paces on a Sunday morning. We have members shooting hi-tech compound bows, crossbows, recurve bows and even sticks from the hedge are put to use!
