Explore West Norfolk's Haunted Hotspots: An Interactive Ghost Map


A new interactive map has been created showing nearly 400 haunted locations in the West Norfolk area; clicking on the icons brings up a small summary of the alleged spectres. Naturally, King's Lynn dominates the area!

There are a few claimed ghosts in the Middleton area; the Gate and Middletons have had claims of phantoms in the past, while Middleton Towers is also said to have spectral inhabitants. Most of these claims refer to subtle effects, like the playful pranks of poltergeists.

Slightly further away, Leziate is said to have a "grey lady" and/or World War era soldiers walking on the route of the railway tracks.

New Booking System Launched for Recycling Centres

Norfolk County Council have announced on their website that in November 2024 they will introduce a booking system for all Norfolk recycling centres.

They believe that the booking system will help:

- Reduce congestion;
- Reduce waiting times;
- Save the council money by spreading customer visits across their opening hours;
- Reduce the risk of traders disposing of waste without paying.

The exact launch date will be confirmed closer to the time. Once in operation residents will be able to book a slot using the Norfolk County Council website, up to seven days in advance. Booking slots are every 15 minutes.

When you book you select the date, time and recycling centre you want to visit.

They will then send you a booking confirmation by email. You will be able to cancel or rearrange your booking if needed.

People who don't have access to the internet will be able to call the Customer Service Centre to make a booking. Their number is **0344 800 8020** and they are open **Monday to Friday 9am - 5pm**

Norfolk Libraries provide internet access for anyone without the internet at home.

When you arrive at the recycling centre, staff on site will check you in when you arrive. If you get there early or late, they will do their best to let you in, or you can make an alternative booking.


You don't need to book to visit a reuse shop to shop or to donate items. But you will need to book if you want to leave any waste at the recycling centre during the samevisit. This includes visits on f oot or bicycle. Bookings can be made on the day and up until the time of the booking slot.

August 2024 News from Magpie Centre

Following the Charity Ride held at the Magpie Centre, home of West Norfolk Riding for the Disabled Association in the grounds of Wallington Hall on June 30, we are delighted to report that the event attracted 70 riders and raised £1122 for WNRDA.

Said Ellie Head, Chairwoman of Hoofbeats, who organised the ride: 'Two of the riders are registered disabled and we were happy to support the Magpie Centre and all the good work it does. We are already looking forward to another successful ride next year!'

And moving from four feet to two, Stephen Riley-Elliot, whose child rides at the Magpie Centre put in a huge effort to accomplish a 50 km Ultra Marathon (Boudicca Way 50K) on July 20, boosting the Centre's funds by a further £1175 in sponsorship.

An aspect of the Centre's work, which is gaining momentum is for home-schooled children, many of whom are on the autistic spectrum to take up riding. The benefits are not only physical but include increased confidence and enhanced communication skills.

If you wish to explore this option, please call the Magpie Centre office on 01553 810202 to request an application form. Once this has been completed and returned, the participant will have an assessment, which lasts about half an hour and is free of charge. If all goes well, the participant will be slotted into a class (maximum 4 riders) of riders of similar ability for regular lessons.

Knowledge of horses and/or of people living with disability, although desirable is not essential. More important is the ability to lead a team including staff, volunteers and the board of trustees. Snow Leopard and Birds of Mongolia

Presented by Sue Bryan

Mongolia is a landlocked country in East Asia, situated on the Mongolian Plateau, it is one of the most exciting and remote birding destinations in Asia with Siberian taiga forest, vast seamless steppe grassland, numerous freshwater and brackish lakes, the Gobi Desert and impressive mountains, the highest point being the Khüiten Peak in the far west, near the triple border with China and Russia, at a height of 14,350 feet (4,374 meters).

Mongolia is a fascinating country with a suite of interesting Eastern Palearctic bird species, many of which occur only in high altitude, dry desert areas.

However there was one target in mind for the trip to Mongolia: that of the enigmatic **Snow Leopard**.

Sue's talk will tell a tale of the scouting trip to this amazing destination; of living in an open top ger with freezing-cold nights; surviving the rough, boulder-strewn tracks on the high altitude steppe; to the countless hours of scanning and searching. It will also reveal the joys of breaking down and having the van engine removed whilst out of any signal telephone network, all in an effort to see a **Snow Leopard** in the vast, sparsely populated landscapes in Mongolia and afterwards enjoying birding forays to huge lakes on the vast lower elevation plains and valleys below the snow-capped mountains.

Highlight of summer activities at the Magpie Centre, home of West Norfolk Riding for the Disabled Association was a hugely successful Open Day on Saturday August 17.

More than 200 visitors attended the event, which included a Musical Ride performed by a group of RDA riders and a demonstration of Equine Assisted Learning Therapy, a programme which encourages interaction between horses and people to promote mental wellbeing.

But star of the show was Colin Perriss, past West Norfolk RDA Chairman, riding Ava, in a demonstration of Horseback Archery. This segment was introduced by Troy Shaw of New Leaf Triangle Horseback Archery, Melton Mowbray, who gave a rundown of the history of horseback archery, followed by an explanation of how to train a horse to accept a rider guiding it with their torso and legs only and shooting while mounted.

Colin has been training with Troy for the past four years and the display culminated in his cantering round the arena and gaining good scores for hitting the target. Visitors had a very happy day, with one saying: 'We've had a lovely day out. There was something to interest everyone, adults and children alike and the atmosphere was so friendly. We're looking forward to next year's Open Day already,' she added. The event raised almost £3,000 for the Magpie Centre.

East Winch Parish Council Meetings

23 JULY 2024 and 3 SEPTEMBER 2024

(It was not possible to include a report on the Parish Council's July meeting in the last Parish Newsletter as the meeting took place after the newsletter's print deadline).

Trod – At its July meeting, the Parish Council welcomed the news that NCC Highways was to re-start work on the Trod (together with rectifying the flood risk on the bend by Old Station Yard) on 12 August. However, in the event, work had to be suspended due to a permissions issue that arose. It is hoped that this issue will be resolved and that work can recommence on or just after 4 November. Meantime, we are grateful to our two Borough Councillors (Messrs De Whalley and Anota) who personally cut back and cleared the undergrowth affecting the Trod which had built up following funding cuts in Highways' maintenance programme. It is clear though that a permanent regular solution will have to be found.

Grandcourt Quarry extension and Sibelco Liaison Committee – Following the approval of Sibelco's application to extend Grandcourt Quarry in July, we believe it will be important for there to be closer engagement with the local East Winch community. The Parish Council is very keen to see the reestablishment of regular meetings of the Sibelco Liaison Committee, and it is understood that Sibelco management is open to this. At the September meeting, the Parish Council learned that work was commencing on the rerouting of electricity supply cabling to bypass the Grandcourt Quarry extension site.

Risk Assessment – The Chair of the Parish Council, Alan Yarham, undertakes a regular risk assessment inspection of village equipment, including street lighting, salt bins, etc. and he reports on any problems so that remedial steps can be taken. There is currently an issue with the defibrillator but this is being actively addressed. If you are aware of any other issues please contact our Parish Council Clerk, Bob Pannell. Planning – The retrospective application for change of use from agricultural barn to multi-use venue at Manor Farm, Church Land was refused planning permission. The retrospective application for 3 storage yards at Old Station Yard was withdrawn. The Parish Council was to attend a preliminary hearing on the application to nominate land at Pentney Woods, Common Road, West Bilney as an Asset of Community Value.

Open Forum for Parishioners - A Parishioner requested that dog waste bins be installed at the two parking places at West Bilney Woods. The Parish Council agreed to look into the possibility (but noted that the land in question belonged to the Forestry Commission).

Village Hall – The Treasurer of East Winch Village Hall attended the meeting and he reported that all four of the current Charity Trustees wished to step down. He noted that previous attempts to recruit new volunteers had not been successful, so this raised a real possibility that the charity might have to be dissolved and the Hall permanently closed. An AGM was to be convened on 24 September to discuss the matter and residents were encouraged to attend.

North Runcton News

West Winch Growth Area (WWGA)

As I imagine most people are now aware, the outline planning application for 1100 new homes, a new primary school and other associated infrastructure to be located at 'Constitution Hill', was granted consent by the BCKLWN planning committee on the 28th August. The scheme, promoted by Hopkins Homes who do intend to build some of the houses, falls entirely within North Runcton Parish (Hardwick Ward). The whole parish presently has less than 300 households.

This scheme constitutes the single largest housing development to be granted planning consent in West Norfolk for many years. (To put it into context, the two housing schemes now under construction in South Wootton amount to 530 dwellings and the scheme at Knights Hill, now underway, is for 600 dwellings).

The expected programme of works will be something like the following:

- Hopkins Homes / BCKLWN to formalise agreement of Section 106 monies (by December 2024).
- Hopkins Homes to submit details of the scheme in order to discharge reserved matters (expected to take 12-18 months)
- Likely earliest start of building (roads and infrastructure) – Spring 2026
- Likely completion of the first houses Spring 2027.
- The first phase of development will be an 11-hectare portion in the south-west corner of the site, opposite the 'Winch' public house, with 300 houses.

It is conditioned that before the 300th house is occupied, the 'estate feeder road' (through the Hopkins land to provide access onto the A47) is complete and open.

Please note this feeder road is not the WW Housing Access Road that will run north/south from the A47 to Gravelhill Lane. That is a separate project that NCC are still awaiting government funding for in order to confirm it will proceed. It is anticipated that the whole Hopkins estate may take up to 15 years to build out – but this of course depends on sales, the economy and demand. It is probable that Hopkins will sell portions of the site to other builders.

This project obviously represents a huge change for North Runcton and West Winch and indeed, King's Lynn. Other parts of the planned WWGA are likely to have planning consent and be partly built and occupied by the time the Hopkins estate is complete. As noted at the planning meeting, when the entire growth area is complete, the population combined with the existing villages of West Winch and North Runcton is likely to exceed 12,000 – larger than Downham Market is today.

To assist residents with any queries about the WWGA we will be updating the 'Frequently Asked Questions' on the Parish Council website and BCKLWN will also be publishing them.

WWHAR

You might be aware that the estimated cost of the Housing Access Road has been revised upwards to £109 million. The County Council cabinet have agreed this extra cost, including increasing their contribution towards it. They hope that government will announce that they will provide the main portion of the funding in their October budget statement.

We also understand that a new round of consultation will shortly open regarding the road planning application. In particular this is because detailed comments from some statutory consultees have still not been received. Notably this includes Natural England (who have recently objected to the Norwich Western Bypass because of the impact on protected species).

Other planning news

A final consultation on the new Local Plan continues until 2nd October. This relates to modifications to the Plan made by BCKLWN following the examination hearings earlier in the year. You can read the consultation documents on the Borough website Local Plan Review pages. They hope the new plan will be adopted by March 2025.

The plan proposes that 554 new homes will need to be completed in the Borough every year for the next 19 years. However, the government are themselves presently consulting on changes to the National Planning Policy Framework.

They have stated that the national target for new home completions should be 1.5 million in the next 5 years (a scale of building not seen in the UK since the 1970s). it is very likely that the number of houses proposed in West Norfolk will have to be revised upwards to meet the government goal.

Cut out the bonfires!

At the North Runcton Parish Council complaints were again heard about antisocial bonfires. They have been a particular nuisance in the summer when people are often outside enjoying the fine weather and/or have doors and windows open in their houses.

Advice on 'Bonfire Etiquette' was previously published on the Parish Council website and is still available to read. It is illegal to burn household waste and green waste can be placed in the brown bins or taken to the recycling centre at Saddlebow for free.

The Borough Council will investigate complaints of smoke and fumes. They have the power to issue an 'abatement notice' if a neighbour's bonfire is deemed to be causing a nuisance and will impose fines if the abatement notice is not followed.

North Runcton Conservation Volunteers

Since the last parish newsletter we have undertaken a management session at Sheep's Course Wood which resulted in a reasonable amount of litter being removed, shrubs trimmed along the main footpaths and removal of undergrowth around young trees and hedge plants that we planted a few years ago.

The next session will be a litter pick around North Runcton meeting at 09:30 at the Scout Hut on Saturday 26th October. For more specific information please email me at cllrpalmer@northrunctonpc.co.uk.

The RSPCA is urging more people in Norfolk to demonstrate their passion for wildlife by doing their bit to protect and nurture wildlife in their own gardens and green spaces.

There are so many ways people can help our wildlife through creating a wildlife garden, or even sign up as an RSPCA Wildlife Friend

And as the fireworks season draws closer and Bonfire night looms people can also take action to help protect wildlife.

The RSPCA's wildlife centres - in Norfolk, East Sussex, Cheshire, Somerset and Wiltshire - care for around 14,000 animals every

year, including many who have been found sick or injured.

And as the RSPCA celebrates its 200th birthday this year, we also launched our Million Strong Movement, to encourage, inspire and empower more people to be animal champions, whether that be by donating to us to support our work, rescuing animals in need themselves, or helping wildlife thrive and flourish in their garden.

Norfolk is home to the East Winch Wildlife Centre which has rescued and rehabilitated thousands of wild animals over the years with everything from seals, water birds, garden birds, foxes, deer, badgers, birds of prey and even bats!

The centre is currently caring for over 300 animals including a whopping 250 hedgehogs, as well as seals, owlets, fawns, buzzards, swans and ducks to name just a few.

Throughout the year the centre deals with an influx of British wildlife and their work is only possible thanks to their supporters who provide donations such as bedding, equipment and donate to any fundraising appeals.

Norfolk is a county of wildlife lovers - but for those wanting to do more to help - there are lots of ways this can be done.

10 tips to create a wildlife-friendly garden

- 1. Leaving 'wild', insect-friendly areas in your garden to encourage insects.
- 2. Avoiding netting to cover ponds, fruit or vegetables as animals can become easily entangled, causing serious injuries and sometimes death and putting away sports netting when not in use.
- 3. Covering all drains and leaving watering cans upside down to prevent animals from falling in or becoming trapped.
 4. Checking carefully for animals before mowing or strimming the lawn; checking bonfires for hibernating animals before setting light to them; and never disturbing nesting or hibernating animals.
- 5. Providing logs, compost and leaf piles which provide shelter for animals like hedgehogs and are havens for insects.
 6. Ensuring there is a slope or ramp out of any ponds which provide a natural source of water and attract food sources such as insects to create easy access in and out.
- 7. Creating homes for wildlife such as hogitats (hedgehog homes), bat boxes, bird boxes, bee houses and insect hotels. 8. Leaving out fresh, clean water and food sources (such as meaty food like dog food for hedgehogs, or nuts, seeds and grains for birds here are some ideas on what to feed the birds).
- 9. Avoiding using dangerous pesticides and other harmful chemicals, but store any chemicals away from any wildlife and pets.
- 10. Planting a range of native plants, to encourage pollinators such as bees, hoverflies and butterflies.

Or you can sign up to be a Wildlife Friend:

Around 1,400 people have already signed up as an RSPCA Wildlife Friend in 2024, taking on different activities to help nature each month. From picking litter to rewilding gardens by planting pollinators, to building habitats so wild animals can thrive, the animal charity's volunteers have thrown themselves wholeheartedly into Wildlife Friends initiative since the scheme was launched in March.

The RSPCA's Wildlife Friends are making a difference to protect and nurture wildlife in their own gardens and green spaces by accomplishing a range of tasks. During the summer months dedicated volunteers will be creating drink stations for wildlife, making butterfly cafes and providing treats for garden birds, as well as leaving food out for hedgehogs.

Everyone can help create a better world for every animal. Whether you have five minutes or five hours to spare each week, whether you live in a flat, narrowboat or house with a garden - there are tasks suitable for everyone to complete for all the four seasons of the year.

Together with fellow Wildlife Friends you will be making a positive impact on your local community by creating safe, clean and healthy habitats, and a better environment for animals to thrive.

Bonfire night:

As the fireworks season draws closer and Bonfire night looms, people can also take action to help protect wildlife. It is heartbreaking to see the distress caused to so many animals by fireworks - too many animals are suffering each year, including wildlife.

Loud bangs, flashing lights and large crowds of people cause stress and physical harm to a range of wildlife, but this can largely go unnoticed as our wonderful wild animals suffer out of sight. We believe all public fireworks displays need to be licensed by the relevant authority, and that information about the proposed display must be provided in the local area in advance with a process for local residents to appeal against the granting of the licence.

We need the public to make their voice heard loud and clear to help us secure these changes. Join our #BangOutOfOrder campaign and visit our website.

How to help:

- Always thoroughly disturb bonfires immediately before you light them, as there could be hedgehogs nesting or hiding inside. Moving the whole bonfire by hand before setting it alight is the best way of ensuring that hedgehogs and other wildlife aren't sleeping in there'.
- Try using 'silent' fireworks. These are quieter than traditional fireworks, so although they're not silent, they will be less likely to disturb wildlife, and other animals.
- Be sure to clear up any litter from events; fireworks contain toxic chemicals which can be harmful to the environment.
